

#### **Using the Methodist Prayer Handbook**

The Prayer Handbook is arranged as a **monthly cycle**, starting with day 1 of the month on page 12. You can use it as a daily devotional or just dip in. Whether you are leading a group or praying on your own, you might find it helpful to select only a few prayers for each day; and use different prayers from that day during another month – so that you are not praying the same prayers every month.

Do add your own notes in the margins to remind you of things you would like to pray for on particular days. You may also want to add your own prayers for the people listed at the side of each page.

**General prayers** are on pages 2-9, which you can use for collective worship, in other settings, or privately. These include prayers specific to the activities of the Methodist Church in Britain.

The **lectionary** on pages 43-58 offers suggestions for a Scripture reading, hymn and psalm for each day of the year, alongside commitments from A Methodist Way of Life. For a daily commentary on each lectionary reading, please look at the Methodist Church online Bible study A Word in Time at **methodist.org.uk/a-word-in-time**

### A word from the President and Vice-President of the British Methodist Conference 2023/2024

The words of Isaiah 45:3 were spoken to people experiencing huge disruption, conflict and challenge. Likewise, God is with us in our challenging times. Even in the midst of uncertainty, we hear stories about how people have encountered God at work in unexpected places, and amongst unexpected people. Finding these hidden treasures and riches in our churches and communities can help us to rediscover a sense of hope about what lies ahead and find a renewed calling to see where God is at work and join in (missio Dei).

It is perhaps deeply prophetic to hope for "treasures and riches" whilst also acknowledging that the dominant narrative around us is that of decline, fragility and vulnerability. As we are reminded in Romans 8:22-29 and Psalm 139, sometimes the potential and breadth of the riches of God's work remain unknown for a long time, as if performing the hidden work of gestation before coming to birth.

To continue to follow God in these uncertain times means having the courage to recognise that the Church we are called to become may look different to what we are used to. Yet, even as new church communities and gatherings are forming in exciting and different ways, they carry with them some of our 'Methodist DNA' – the treasures of our distinctive Methodist tradition and heritage.

Our hope and prayer is that we will all be open to seeing the treasures revealed to us in our own contexts. I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches hidden in secret places, so that you may know that it is I, the LORD, the God of Israel, who call you by your name.

# Prayers to live out Our Calling with our global partners


#### Service across the world





#### A Methodist Way of Life Examen



A Methodist Way of Life provides twelve commitments and practices that encourage us to respond to God's love and live a better Christian life. They are summarised in these twelve words: pray, worship, notice, care, learn, open, serve, flourish, challenge, tell, live, share. You can find more information about each one on the commitment cards for A Methodist Way of Life, and online at methodist.org.uk/MWOL

As Methodists, we are encouraged to reflect regularly on these twelve commitments, particularly with the Holy Spirit's guidance. 'A Methodist Way of Life Examen' is based on the Examen described by St Ignatius of Loyola. As part of your daily prayers, you are invited to use these five steps below, while focusing on one of the twelve commitments suggested for each day.

#### **The Five Steps**

#### **Ask God for light**

I want to reflect on the day with God's eyes.

#### **Give thanks**

I give thanks for the gift of the day and recognise when I have noticed God's presence.

#### **Review recent days**

I look back over recent days, guided by the Holy Spirit, and reflect carefully on one of the twelve commitments.

#### **Face shortcomings**

I face up to what I have not been able to do well, particularly reflecting on my shortcomings in relation to one of the twelve commitments.

#### Look towards the day to come

I pray that God will guide me in the day to come and help me notice opportunities to practise one of the twelve commitments.







## The Presidency

Each year, the Methodist Conference elects the President and the Vice-President to preside over the following year's Conference. They then spend that year representing the Methodist Church as they travel around the Connexion and abroad.

The role of President of the Methodist Conference is reserved for presbyters and that of Vice-President for lay people or deacons.

She chairs the Ministries Committee overseeing the development of the Church's ministry in many varied contexts, and also serves on the Strategy and Resources Committee and the Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes Board. She has previously chaired the Ministerial Candidates and Probationers Oversight Committee and served as Chair of the Chairs.

The Revd Gill Newton said in response to her election: "I am both humbled and honoured to have been entrusted with this role by the members of the Methodist Conference. With God's help and together with the Vice-President, Deacon Kerry Scarlett, I look forward to the opportunity to encourage, inspire and challenge the Methodist people."

Kerry Scarlett, from the Birmingham District, has a passion for justice and seeks to enable and amplify the voices of others. She founded Adavu (adavu. org.uk), an anti-trafficking charity and has participated in regional, network and anti-trafficking campaigns.

Kerry has served the Church in a number of ways, including theological education, the Learning Network, a variety of committees including the Candidates Committee and has contributed to and facilitated complex reviews.

Speaking at her induction, Deacon Kerry Scarlett shared the Presidential theme of 'Hidden Treasures', calling for: "The Methodist Church in Britain, to re-discover our treasures, both old and new. We need ... to understand who we are, as a Church, and what God is calling us to be ... To find out the glimmers of where God is, in the unexpected people and places where transformation is taking place."
